

Pupil Premium Grant Report: 2017-18

Aim: To ensure that the Pupil Premium is used to reach the pupils who need it most and make a significant impact on their education and lives.

Objectives

- 1. To provide additional educational support to improve the progress and raise the standard of achievement for pupils in receipt of the PPG.
- 2. To diminish the distance between the achievement of these pupils and their peers.
- 3. To address any underlying inequalities between children eligible for Pupil Premium and others, as far as the school's powers allow.
- 4. To enable the schools and families to work together to improve these pupils' progress.

The main barriers to educational achievement faced by eligible pupils at our school

- 1. **Emotional and social issues** which impact on the behavior and progress of some students.
- 2. The need for additional support in core subjects.
- 3. Financial restrictions which mean that the children can't participate fully in school life.

Attainment of children with Pupil Premium Grant

Due to the small number of pupil premium children per cohort, attainment data will not be published. The impact on each pupil is evaluated termly as part of our assessment and tracking procedures. Evaluation focuses on academic gains and how pupils' self-confidence has developed as a consequence of the intervention/additional support. This data is shared with Governors and is continually under review.

Looking ahead to 2018-19

We don't anticipate any major changes to the barriers to learning of our pupil premium children.

Regular monitoring and tracking of pupils' progress, monitoring of attendance, and observations regarding self-esteem, engagement and general well-being will be used to measure the impact and effect of the strategies that have been implemented using the expenditure of the pupil premium allocation.

At the end of the academic year, attainment comparisons will be made against pupils eligible for pupil premium and pupils who aren't eligible for pupil premium.
